### WHAT DOES A COUNSELOR DO?

- Helps with academic problems
- Scheduling issues
- Friend issues, conflict mediation
- Problems at home
- Help talking to a teacher
- Help getting organized
- Mental Health resources like depression, anxiety, self harm, etc.
- Career information
- College information
- Helps you create a plan for your high school career



### HOW CAN YOU SEE YOUR COUNSELOR?

- Tell your teacher you would like to see your counselor, they can contact us to see if we are available, or send you to the office so that you can see if we are free.
- If it is an issue that is very urgent, make sure you tell your teacher. You don't have to tell them the details of what it is, but tell them it is very important that you see us as soon as possible.
- We ask that you go to class first. Do not come in between classes. You could get counted as skipping if your teacher does not know where you are.
- You can email us and request an appointment. Our email addresses are found on the website.
- You can also have your parents call or email us and request an appointment.
- You can drop a note in one of the Ski boxes or leave a note for us at the main office.
- Catch us at lunch or in the hallways.
- Please know we will see you as soon as we can!

### STATE TESTS CONT.

• Students studying Advanced Placement (AP) or International Baccalaureate (IB) courses in biology, American history or American government may take and substitute test scores for end-of-course state exams to avoid double testing. Students also may substitute grades from College Credit Plus courses in these science and social studies subjects for end-of-course state exams.



### WORKKEYS ASSESSMENT

- Industry credential and workforce readiness
- Students earn 12 points through a State Board of Education-approved, industry-recognized credential or group of credentials in a single career field and achieve a workforce readiness score on the WorkKeys assessment. The state of Ohio will pay one time for those who take the WorkKeys assessment.



### ACT/SAT REMEDIATION FREE SCORES

• College and career readiness tests
Students earn <u>"remediation-free" scores</u> in English language arts and mathematics on a nationally recognized college admission exam. The state of Ohio will pay one time for all 11th grade students in the classes of 2018 and beyond to take either the <u>ACT or SAT free of charge</u>. The student's district selection applies to all schools in the district for one school year. Test selection may change from one school year to the next.



# PEWAIVER

You must go online to <a href="www.taylorathletics.org">www.taylorathletics.org</a> under files/links tab for a PE waiver application. In order to get the waiver, you must complete 2 seasons of a sport, marching band or colorguard. This can be done throughout the four years of high school. You must complete the application and turn it in to the athletic office. Make sure you check your paperwork!!

### CREDIT FLEXIBILITY

- ■Students can earn units of high school credit based on an individually developed and school approved credit flex plan.
- Students can earn this credit by:
  - Completing coursework
  - ■Testing or showing mastery of course content
  - Pursing an educational option or individually approved option and/or
  - ■Any combination of the above

Applications due dates can be found in the course registration booklet and on the website.



### COLLEGE CREDIT PLUS

- Any student in grades 7 12 who meets admission requirements may take college level courses for dual credit at any public university in Ohio. Many private schools also offer CCP programs.
- You must turn in a Letter of Intent to your school by April 1st.
- You must complete the admission process for whatever school you are applying to and meet all of their deadlines.



#### **SCHEDULE CHANGES**

Preparing the master schedule and individual schedules is a very important and involved process. Parents and their student should devote adequate thought and planning to course selections prior to submitting course requests. After the course selection sheet has been turned in and entered into the computer, it will be considered a final schedule request.

- ■A student may make a schedule change only under one of the following circumstances:
  - Administrative Error
  - ► Academic level change that is found to be in the best interest of the student (teacher/counselor recommendation)
  - ■Dropping a study hall. Students in grades 9 12 must maintain enrollment in six (6). If a course is dropped before September 1<sup>st</sup> or January 26<sup>th</sup> (2<sup>nd</sup> sem), students will receive a "W" on their report card and transcript. If the course is dropped after these dates, a "W/F" (withdrawn/failure) will show on their report card and transcript as well as reflect in GPA. If a student wishes to add a course in place of a study hall, he/she must notify his/her counselor prior to the first day of school.

- Take on a leadership role in a club, sport, or part time job.
   Show leadership in volunteer activities.
- Pur your stamp on something! Don't just be a member...make a difference. Create a project or activity that will help someone in our community. Do things that you can talk about on resumes or in college interviews.
- Start writing everything down. Keep a resume of all activities so that during your senior year you can have it ready to go when you start applying for colleges and scholarships. You can do this through you Naviance account. Write down everything whether you think it "counts" or not.

- Utilize your Naviance account
- Search Ohio Means Jobs- ohiomeansjobs.org
- Go on college visits- 2 excused visits during your 11<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup> grade year.
- Talk to students already in college
- Attend college rep visits during homeroom and take advantage of lunch room visits



### TESTING.

- ACT vs. SAT
  - Which test you take depends on the schools to which you are applying. Check their websites to make sure you are taking the required admissions test.
  - Most schools will take either test

If you have not already done so, you need to be registering for the test.



# HOW DO I REGISTER?

You are responsible for registering for the test on your own. Your counselor can assist you but it is best to do with your parents since you will need a credit card to pay for the test. You can register online for the test using the websites below.

- All Division I & II athletes must go through the Clearinghouse in order to play in college.
- Division I: range of eligibility requirements for both core GPA and SAT or ACT scores (combined).
- Division II: core GPA must be 2.0+, SAT 820+.
